CIVIL WAR TALKS



CHAIRMAN'S DIARY

A good mix of meetings again this month on behalf of the Society. January kicked-off with my first ever meeting with the Worcestershire legend that is Malcolm Atkin. It was a privilege to meet with the man who taught me so much about the Civil War in Worcestershire through his marvellous books; I actually took all my Atkins books and asked him to sign them for me!

Later the same day I met with David Nash, (who I keep going to call Graham. Those of a certain vintage will understand, I'm sure). David is now in charge of the Commandery and could not have been more helpful, especially in relation to our forthcoming series of Civil War talks. David is also Chairman of the Vesta Tilley Society and a keen social historian, and it was very clear that we have a strong supporter in him.

Canon Paul Tongue managed to see me for a whole morning to discuss the service in September,

despite very difficult family circumstances. Paul, I'm sure we all wish you and your family the very best in the weeks and months ahead.

Apart from a delightful meeting with Cllr. Joy Squires, (see above also), I met with Cllr. Simon Geraghty, the Deputy Leader of the County Council. Simon is another great advocate for what our Society in promoting a greater understanding of the Battle can do for the City. It is so encouraging to speak to our representatives of whatever political party and discover that we as a Society and what we represent is supported consistently and genuinely. Both Joy and Simon gave me some very useful suggestions and clearly we have two friends here, one from each side of the political divide.

I was invited to visit The Elms School in Malvern to discuss with the teaching staff a Civil War project they are undertaking. I am very keen to involve youngsters of all ages, and all backgrounds,

especially as the Civil War appears so low down the pecking order of history education priorities, (an absolute disgrace).The meeting was very encouraging and will help us in establishing later this year the Junior Section of the Society, after all these youngsters will be the Society members of the future.

At the quarterly Battle of Worcester Partnership meeting at the Guildhall I had the opportunity to chat with, amongst others, Ian Blyth of the Sealed Knot. Ian has undertaken to do what he can to harness support for our aims within his own society. Excellent chap!

Finally, also met with representatives of the Museums Service, and of course, regularly met with other Executive Committee members, especially Richard and Natalie.

COMMANDERY NEWS

As April approaches, (the date when the consultants appointed by Museums Worcestershire is due to make public their recommendations), there is no further concrete news to report. In the short term, David Nash's appointment to the Commandery is reflected in the increased number of events the Society plan to hold there. The Commandery is our "natural" home and your Executive Committee will endeavour to establish a permanent home there for the Battle of Worcester (and Powick) and the Civil War in Worcestershire in general. We will, however, as I have mentioned before, keep our options open and see what transpires in April.

NATIONAL CIVIL WAR CENTRE - NEWARK

A deputation of the Executive Committee have been invited to Newark in early February to talk with those who are establishing the new National Civil War Centre, which is due to open later this year. The Executive Committee believe that the County and City Councils missed a wonderful opportunity to put Worcester at the epicentre of the Civil War some years ago, but it's all water under the bridge now, and I believe we are all pushing in the same direction. Much can be learnt from the Newark experience and we should be able to compliment one another, especially as I am using the tagline which seems to have met with with general approval:

"WORCESTER - THE CIVIL WAR CITY Where the English Civil War Began and Ended 1642 - 1651"

Ultimately, I would like to see a two-centre Civil War experience, Worcester twinned with Newark.

FUNDRAISING

I am delighted that the new structure of the Executive Committee will allow Ben to focus exclusively on fundraising for the Society. Ben is, of course, ideally suited to the role and will be visiting the United States with senior Patron, Lord Faulkner, at the end of September. Meetings will be set-up in advance, using the many key contacts Lord Faulkner has "across the pond", with the additional assistance of the U.S. Ambassador and local MP, Robin Walker. The hard work of fundraising for our first realistic major project really begins here. "The Presidents" monument (Ken Potts's superb piece of Presidents Adams and Jefferson during their 1786 Worcester visit) atop Fort Royal is our goal, but many hundreds of thousands of pounds - and dollars! - will need to be raised before this can be achieved. The benefits for Worcester and its economy are obvious, not if, but when we get there.


CROMWELL'S CROSSING

Tony Spicer of the Battlefields Trust has had the working of an information panel agreed at the recent meeting of the Battle of Worcester Partnership. It is hoped that the panel will be in situ soon. Work to clear the acces path to, what is a beautiful spot, will need to carried out, and I have mentioned this to Joy Squires, who is looking into it. Further updates will follow.

FORT ROYAL RETAINING WALL, LONDON ROAD AND THE MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT FOR WORCESTER!

As an acknowledged and well-documented apolitical animal, I have said before and will say so many times in the future, I'm sure, how lucky we are in the Society to have Robin Walker to represent us. He is a great supporter (and member) of the Society and bangs the drum for us

inside and outside the House whenever he can. Recently Robin suggested, what I thought to be an excellent idea, which I have since followed through with the City Council and await its response. Robin suggested painting the retaining wall of Fort Royal along London Road with a mural of the Battle of Worcester. Tastefully done, this would be a piece of free advertising and highlight to the casual passer by and those stuck in traffic queueing to get into Worcester where Fort Royal is. The work need not cost very much at all. It is a project which could be designed and produced by the University or one of the colleges, or a combination of all three. We would of course oversee the design! The problem may be the condition of the wall itself. A recent survey gave the wall the all clear, but vegetation is a problem and there might be a problem applying the paint straight onto the brickwork. But we'll see. Great idea, Robin, let's hope it takes off.

TAMAR CLOSE

City Archaeologist and Chairman of the Worcestershire Archaelogical Society, James Dinn, conducted the Vice-Chairman Richard Shaw and I, along with Chris Guy, the Cathedral Archaeologist and Tony Spicer of the Battlefields Trust on a fascinating field walk of the Tamar Close site. Situated in the middle of a 1960s residential development near Newtown Road, and surrounded on three sides by houses, it would be impossible to find unless one knew it was there. But for Civil War buffs like me it was such a wonderful discovery.

James explained how the field work, which is a raised artillery platform surrounded by a deep ditch, was used by the besieging Parliamentary forces in 1646. Though the views into the City were obscured by self-sown trees and other impedimenta, it was easy to imagine how shots could rain down into the City from the vantage point. James said there was a similar structure, (there would have been several), built on what is now Rainbow Hill, and pointed out how easy it would have been to send signals from one battery to another.

It is hoped that as part of the proposed Sheriff's Gate development that the site will get a general "spruce up" and an interpretation panel situated overlooking the City.

WORCESTER - THE CIVIL WAR CITY

WHERE THE CIVIL BEGAN AND ENDED 1642 - 1651

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
