THE SUCCESS OF THE THE BULLETIN

I am delighted that the monthly Bulletin is being so well received. When I took on the Chair last November I wanted to ensure that members were kept up to date with all the latest news and opinions concerning the Society. Though we are still experiencing the odd hiccough here and there, I believe we are getting there.

This month marks the fifth issue and I have yet to receive a letter, email, article or question from a member for inclusion! So please, if you have anything you would like to say or ask the membership, do please drop me a line.

GOOD NEWS FROM THE COMMANDERY

A report of the Joint Museums Committee was approved in early March which in turn has paved the way for the implementation, subject to acquiring the necessary funding, of "THE COMMANDERY REDEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME 2014-2019" from Museums Worcestershire. My understanding is that the Programme will be discussed at a Presentation in the Guildhall on 8th April to which your Chairman and Vice-Chairman have been invited.

The Programme consists of four distinct phases, which I will endeavour to summarise:

Phase 1 From May 2014 - September 2015



"Civil War Focus"
Funding applications will be made in May to the Heritage
Lottery Fund (£100,000); Friends of Worcester City Museum (£3,000), to be matched by Trusts and Foundations, and the Society too (£15-20,000). The Battle of Worcester Society are asked to support funding for this initial phase and the final phase 4. See below.

Two potential partners have

been identified. The Battle of Worcester Society is the the first. I have canvassed unceasingly for the Battle to "return home" and have made it clear that the Society will do all it can to assist Museums Worcestershire, and the City and County Councils, to create awareness for the project through partnerships, and by the same method achieve the necessary fundraising goals.

The second partner identified for the first phase is The Canals and River Trust.

The Programme clearly identifies the Battle of Worcester and the Civil War as the unique selling point to the general public, tourists and potential funders, and this is reflected in its pre-eminence from the outset.

The "Elements" of the first phase are, in full

- :* Short run of rooms with increased interpretation of the Civil War/Battle of Worcester Story Chairman's comment: My concern here is the word "short". I want to see, for example, the majority of the Garden Wing given over to the Battle and the Civil War. It is the "main attraction" and USP. With our Civil War partners, Newark for example, and friends such as the The Sealed Knot offering help and advice, and in time the likely acquisition of Civil War arifacts on long-term loan from other galleries and museums, sufficient space is esential to entertain, educate and inform.
- * More replica 17th century handling items to use with schools and visitors Chairman's comment: Excellent. Perhaps our Society volunteers can help here. Also, I have flagged up that several of the Society will be happy to talk to groups of adults, students or children about the various aspects of the Battle and the Civil War in general.
- * A rejuvenated brand identity Chairman's comment: Agreed. I would like



to see a sub-brand or separate brand identity for the Battle of Worcester/Civil War element. This could perhaps be in the shape of a competition open to schools or colleges.

* A system of improved signage for the site both inside and out that can be added to at each successive phase

Chairman's Comment: I have lost count of the number of times I've been asked where the Civil War museum is. Any new signage exercise should be implemented with a view to future road signage from motorways, "A" roads and around the City Centre.

*Guidebook focusing on architectural significance of the building Chairman's Comment: I assume this will cover aspects of the Battle. The Society are keen to increase our own publishing output and are currently working on a book about the Batttle for children.

* Inclusion in Birmingham to Worcester Canal 200 years celebrations, potentially via a canal-side art commission looking back to the 17th century

Chairman's Comment: Excellent idea. Perhaps we could include some pieces of art relating to the Battle....the Bridge of Boats might be appropriate!

Phase 2 Funding applications Summer 2014/complete end 2016

"Sustainable Approach"

This phase involves the more commercial element of income potential, such as lettings, weddings, as well as energy savings, across all museum sites.

Phase 3 Funding Applications 2015 - Developments Launch September 2016 and September 2017

"Commandery Treasure"

This is a community groups, schools and colleges phase, with site improvements, better shop and front facade (hurrah!) and a greater focus on the Gardens.

Phase 4 Funding Applications 2017- Developments and Public Launch September 2018 and September 2019

"Worcester, City of Liberty"

With the majority of funding hopefully coming from the HLF again, the Battle of Worcester Society are seen as key partners for this fourth and final stage. Other likely partners are the House of Commons Archives, Destination Worcestershire and specialist tourist providers. The "Elements" of the Fourth Phase in full, are:

* Creation of a President's Room and better orientation spaces and signage
Chairman's Comment: The President's Room will prove hugely beneficial to the Society and
Worcester in general. With interest from the United States sure to grow, it is essential that the
famous quote of President Adams, when in Worcester with President Jefferson, is made into a
central feature. The Civil War and the Battle of Worcester made an enormous impact in the
Colonies. Many returned to fight in the Mother Country, and of course, thousands of Scottish
prisoners eventually found their way there to become indentured servants. Many Americans of
Adams' and Jeffersons' generation saw the beginning of thier own "freedom" in our own
Revolution a little over a century earlier.

Such a room is likely to receive financial and cultural support from American business based in the UK and would help to attract overseas visitors on the short trip from Stratford-upon-Avon.

* Development of specialist Democracy Learning Programmes Chairman's comment: I would like to see reference to the Putney Debates of 1647 and the lesser known and poorly documented Whitehall Debates which followed.

* Marketing to Overseas Travel providers Chairman's Comment: The Society U.S. links may prove helpful.

- * Holiday Letting Developments as recommended
- * Replacing current audio guide with a new system using augmented reality technlogy and personal systems

Chairman's Comment: I trust the Society will be asked for some input.

*Development of apps and trails extending outside the building and to other Civil War sites Chairman's Comment: Again, the Society, along with our good friends in the Battlefields Trust, need to be consulted.

CHAIRMAN'S VIEW

I find the proposed programme highly encouraging, and combined with our own Society initiatives, I really do feel we are on the cusp of a major shift in attitudes to "our" Battle and the Civil War in general. In the short term, the visit is key to the success of "The Presidents" monument project.


CHARITABLE STATUS

"CIVIL WAR NIGHTS" AT THE COMMANDERY DR.GLENN FOARD

Despite the inclement weather there was a most encouragingly high turn out for the first in our series of Civil War related talks. Glenn is the country's leading battlefield archaeologist, and for those in the audience who didn't realise beforehand just how fascinating battlefield archaeology can be, they most certainly do now!

Glenn's spoke for about an hour with the aid



of powerpoint, covering sieges, battles and skirmishes. Glenn's particular study of the Battle of Edgehill was used as a classic example of how battlefield archaeology can either prove or disprove theories. For those in the audience interested in the firepower of the period they must have thought Christmas had arrived early. I learnt much about how various weapons were used, their ranges, impacts and why only certain objects can be expected to be found on a Civil War battlefield.

Glenn then kindly took a lively and entertaining Q & A session with some first class questions from what was clearly a very learned floor. Glenn, accompanied by his charming wife, Tracey, a landscape archaeologist, then chatted with members of the audience and signed some of his books that he'd brought along with him.

At the conclusion, Glenn told me he would like to do all he can to help the Society and create awareness of the Civil War heritage that remains in the ground in Worcester and agreed to

meet with me and others in the not too distant future.

A really wonderful evening and the Society have made two new friends in the Foards as a bonus Thank you so much, Glenn, from all that were present.

BATTLEFIELDS TRUST STOW-ON -THE WOLD BATTLEFIELD WALK

On Sunday 23rd March I went with wife, Sally, and a visitng friend on a walk of the battlefield of Stow. Our guide was Simon Marsh of the Trust, ably assisted by Tony Spicer. We set off at 1.30pm and were immediately engulfed in a hail storm! But within minutes the weather gods shined on us and we had an excellent afternoon. What I discovered there is no actual agreement as to where the fighting took place. Simon favoured one position (which I must say I thought preferable for the defending Royalists, whilst Tony advocated another theory. To complicate matters further, there are other possibilities! This uncertainty made for a better afternoon as fellow walkers joined in the debate about this final battle of the Civil War. The sun contiued to shine as we returned to our starting point at 4.20pm. HOWARD ROBINSON'S "FACTS ABOUT THE BATTLE OF WORCESTER" continued (From the Worcester News 2011)

- * In 1651 at the time of the Battle of Worcester, the River Severn was tidal and mostly unfordable, Move although Parliamentary forces under General John Lambert did manage to cross it at Upton. In general terms the river presented a considerable barrier to troops coming from the west, so that bridges, such as those at Stourport and Bewdley, made them strategic crossing points. By contrast the smaller River Teme was fordable: near Bransford by Twistleton's troops and just east of Powick Bridge by Haines' troops.
- * Movements of Parliamentary troops in the weeks before the Battle of Worcester were designed to prevent the King of Scots/Charles Stuart from reaching London. Cromwell's intention was to gather a massive force to inflict a crushing defeat on the Scots/Royalists. Various Parliamentary Generals with their forces came from all directions, thus Charles' potential routes to London were cut off. The road back to Scotland was blocked as the net closed in.
- * In the days leading up to the Battle of Worcester Charles had been hoping to draw reinforcements from Wales and the South- West. He issued a proclamation summoning all loyal subjects to rally to his standard at Worcester in an attempt to mobilise a posse comitatus which required all men between 16 and 60 to muster at Pitchcroft on 26th August. However, only a handful of englishman responded to the summons, so Charles' army remained largely Scottish.
